

Capital Facilities Planning & the CIP

- Growth Management Act (GMA) requires County to maintain a capital facilities element in our Comprehensive Plan.
- The capital facilities element must identify:
 - Public facilities needed to support development and future growth
 - Policies for ensuring coordination and consistency of capital facilities planning and the rest of the comprehensive plan (20-year forecast)
 - Levels of service defined for facilities (e.g., acres of parks per person)
 - A 6-year financing plan showing the funding sources and expected costs of each capital facility
- This 6-year financing plan is known as the Capital Improvement Program (CIP), Appendix G of the Comprehensive Plan

Capital Improvement Program (Appendix G)

- Looks ahead 6 years
- Updated annually more frequently than the rest of the capital facilities element in the Comprehensive Plan
- Is consistent with the county budget
- Identifies funding sources and estimated project costs





Coordinated Planning

CPED coordinates annual update of the CIP, amends other CFP elements in the Comprehensive Plan as needed

What are Capital Facilities

- RCW specifies the minimum for capital facilities
- Each jurisdiction defines and identifies which capital facilities are necessary to support growth
- Projects using REET funds or Impact Fees must be included





Thurston County Capital Facilities

- Transportation system (roads, bridges, etc.)
- Water systems
- Sanitary sewer systems
- Stormwater facilities
- Solid waste systems
- Park and trail facilities
- County buildings
- Public Utility Districts (PUDs)*
- Schools*
- Fire protection facilities*



*Facilities provided by school districts and other governmental agencies are listed separately in the Capital Improvement Plan.



Planning Commission Role

- High-level overview of updated CIP
- Ask questions to department staff
- Host a public hearing, gather public comment
- Make a recommendation to the BoCC







Parks & Trails Projects

- Designed to complete required infrastructure repairs, add capacity to existing facilities and reduce required maintenance costs
- Selected based upon system needs, citizen input, funding availability and professional judgement
- Funding Sources: REET, Impact Fees, Grants/federal Appropriations, Conservation Futures
- 9.7 million over 6 years







Parks & Trails Project Highlights

- Upcoming major projects:
 - Deschutes Falls Park walkway and View Point Improvements
 - Chehalis Western Culvert Replacement
 - Restroom replacements and improvements







Solid Waste Projects

- Designed to provide efficient, reliable, and affordable solid waste collection, handling, recycling and disposal services
- Selected to improve public and employee safety and security, address current and future operational needs, and meet legal and regulatory requirements
- Funding Source: Solid Waste Fund
- 29.7 million over 6 years







Solid Waste Project Highlights

- Upcoming major projects:
 - Flare Station
 - SCADA System Replacement
 - Pump System Upgrades & Improvements
 - Possible South County Transfer Station







Stormwater Utility Projects

- Designed to reduce localized flooding and improve water quality in Thurston County
- Projects will also include capital replacement projects as infrastructure continues to age due to end of life span of county assets
- Selected to meet state/federal requirements and reviewed by the county Storm and Surface Water Advisory Board
- Funding Source: Utility Fees, grants
- 6.4 million over 6 years







Stormwater Utility Project Highlights

- Upcoming major projects:
 - Manzanita Drive Conveyance
 - Madrona Beach Rd NW Vicinity Retrofits
 - Boston Harbor Rd NE Stormwater Conveyance & Outfall Improvements
 - Woodard Creek Retrofit







Water & Sewer Utilities Projects

- Designed to provide safe, reliable drinking water for our customers and to preserve the environmental health of our community
- Selected to meet state and federal regulatory requirements, and service demand
- Funding Source: Utility Fees, REET, American Rescue Plan Act Grant
- 15.8 million over 6 years







Water & Sewer Utilities Project Highlights

- Upcoming major projects:
 - Countywide SCADA Systems Upgrade
 - Boston Harbor Generator Replacement
 - Grand Mound Wastewater Class A Reclamation







Transportation Projects

- Designed to provide safe, reliable transportation infrastructure
- Selected to meet capacity, safety, maintenance, and state/federal requirements
- Funding Source: County Road Fund, Transportation Improvement Fund, Impact Fees, Block Grant, Safe Routes to Schools, Highway Safety Improvement/safety grant, Rural Arterial Program, State Grants, National Highway Freight Program, REET, other, Storm & Surface water Utility Rates, and Public Work Trust Fund Loan
- 99.5 million over 6 years







Transportation Project Highlights

- Upcoming major projects:
 - Marvin Rd Upgrade
 - Pacific Ave SE Pavement Preservation
 - Yelm Hwy SE Pavement Preservation
 - Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Program
 - Intersection improvements







County Facilities Projects

- Designed to provide safe and sustainable public facilities to serve the public
- Selected based upon safety, health, accessibility, sustainability, operational efficiency and effectiveness of the facilities
- Funding Source: Bond, REET, Central Service Building Reserve, Trial Court Improvement Fund, Grant, County Road Fund, American Rescue Plan Act Grant, Detention Sales Tax
- 118.7 million over 6 years







County Facilities Highlights

- Upcoming major projects:
 - Multiple Safety and Security Upgrades
 - Infrastructure Upgrades to Avoid Failures
 - Expansion of Current Ballot Processing Center at Mottman Complex
 - County Wide Vehicle Charging Stations







Schools, fire districts, other

- Provided as information only – CIPs are adopted separately by these entities
- Funding may come from impact fees, mitigation fees, bonds, levies, state funding, grants
