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New Business

5. 6:35 P.M. WORK SESSION #1: UPDATE FOREST CONVERSION ORDINANCE (Staff: Dana Bowers, Ashley Arai)

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Ms. Bowers presented the proposed Forest Conversion Code Update. She highlighted that the commission is only working on phase one of the broader Healthy Forests project. Staff is completing a tree canopy study, which will inform later phases of the project.

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Commissioner Hanson asked about hazard trees and if the 5,000 board feet applies to those. Ms. 12 Bowers stated that the removal of hazard trees falls outside the 5,000 board feet and is allowed. 13 Ms. Bowers also mentioned that the Planning Commission last August wanted some protections 14 built in for wildfire resiliency. Staff indicated that the new Tree Preservation Chapter (17.27) 15 TCC) requires property owners to consider reducing wildfire risk for planned developments. 16 Mr. Davis mentioned the County's requirement to have the wildland urban interface require-17 ments be implemented as part of the State's new building code. Ms. Bowers recalled the first 18 limit being 30 ft from the house with a mature tree. Then out 50 ft with a tree being limbed and 19 having proper treatments for fire retardation. Than 100 ft for a basic open lot. Ms. Arai men-20 tioned that while hazard trees are not specifically called out in phase one of the Healthy Forests 21 project, staff could look at this during phase three alongside other things like the protection of 22 oak woodlands in the critical areas ordinance and the removal of hazard trees in buffer areas. 23 Commissioner Pestinger asked about the timeline of the canopy study and when that may be 24 completed. Ms. Bowers stated that the data was received on June 3rd. There has not been enough 25

time to upload all of it into the GIS system for staff to look at.

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Commissioner Pestinger asked about controlled burns. He was unsure if this was the time to mention that practice. Ms. Bowers stated it is a forestry practice that could be implemented with DNR regulations regarding forest cycles and management of the understory. She will check her notes to find out what level of permit one would need for that practice. He is also concerned with the misinformation citizens have received when it comes to harvesting timber for lump sums of money. Ms. Bowers mentioned a grant won by the conservation district to help educate forest landowners and address this misinformation.

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Commissioner Pestinger also mentioned enforcement of the rules and the cost of permitting. He has witnessed trees being taken down overnight and developers or constituents saying there is next to no enforcement. Or if there is enforcement, the penalty is minimal. He mentioned it sounded as if there was a lot of public comment about enforcement and is hoping something can be added that provides an actual incentive to keep the trees.

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Commissioner Day clarified conversion option harvest plan would require a development plan moving forward. Ms. Bowers clarified that the COHP is for folks that don't know if they are developing or not. Once they decide to develop and receive the development permit, then they would work with the tree conservation plan to ensure the tree density is correct.

45 46 Chair Casino asked what the moratorium release waivers cost now and if there will be a change when this update goes through? Ms. Bowers stated that the fee study now underway could potentially change those fees but that it would not necessarily be part of this code change.

Chair Casino stated that one of the County's permits takes 180 days vs. the 30 days it takes the state. Why is that? Ms. Bowers stated that part of it has to do with the fact the County does not employ foresters. Also, the time it takes to move through each department for permit review. Ms. Arai mentioned there is more than likely a critical areas study that must take place first.

Commissioner Simmons asked if each phase of this project would have a similar workflow as other projects, each phase having multiple work sessions and public hearings. Ms. Bowers stated that yes, minus the canopy study. Because the BoCC is asking for that, and the findings will go directly back to them. However, the Planning Commission would see the study multiple times as it will be used as a resource to inform other phases in this project. He also asked about the term residential dwellings. Does that mean development of a single-family home on a 5-acre plot? Ms. Bowers stated this phase is not focused on subdivisions of plots. That will be included during phase three of the project.

MOTION: <u>Commissioner Day moved to approve the public hearing on July 19, 2023 on the Forest Conversion Ordinance. Commissioner Nelson seconded. The motion carried unanimously.</u>
