


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

What is Treatment Sales Tax?

The Treatment Sales Tax (TST) is a important local funding stream that works alongside federal and state funding such as Medicaid to meet mental health and substance use needs in Thurston County. Washington State law allows counties to collect a 1/10 of 1% sales tax to fund enhanced and expanded substance use and mental health treatment services and for treatment courts.

Thurston County has collected this tax since 2009.



TREATMENT COURTS




Thurston County Treatment Courts operate to reduce participant risk for future justice system involvement by connecting participants with appropriate support and services specific to each Treatment Court. This approach has been found to be more effective than traditional sentencing in both: a) holding individuals accountable, b) promoting positive behavior change, c) engaging participants with necessary support and services, d) providing continuous judicially and community supervision, and e) promoting community safety. TST funds are provided to purchase the staff time needed to fully participate in the activities of each Treatment Court, including the efforts of the Prosecuting Attorney's Office and the Public Defense Office.


Therapeutic Treatment Court participants engage in community service and group/team building activities via a new Community Treatment Court Team that involves members from Mental Health Court, Veterans Court, Drug Court, and DUI Court. This group brings individuals from all courts together and encourages informal peer support amongst the participants as well as providing connections and encouragement to engage in community service and pro-social community involvement activities. This group is facilitated by staff members from both treatment courts and a Resource Development Specialist from the Prosecuting Attorney's office.


YOUTH & FAMILY



A youth was referred to WISe based on school suspension, past Child Protective Services involvement, and ongoing aggressive behaviors (kicking, biting, hitting). The parent's biggest fear was that the youth would hurt someone causing irreparable harm and a large hospital bill. [A] large team of numerous natural supports (family and friends) and the youth was able to "grow from his actions" and develop selfconfidence with excellent coping skills. The team helped the family explore numerous community activities for the youth, such as Boy Scouts, YMCA, fishing, golfing and Nature Nurture Farms. Upon closing, the family was spending positive time together and expressed their hope level at 100 percent. Parent stated, 'Thank you for bringing my son back to me!'





ADULT PROGRAMS



"[A Preparing for Re-entry Program participant] faced several barriers to employment including a significant criminal background with a history of long term prison sentences and mental health. His determination to make positive changes in his life is evident today. He experienced several stressors during job search; however, with wrap around services provided by CDP, Transitions and PREP he overcame his anxiety securing employment. He continues to work for the same employer, graduated from CDP, completed the PREP Program and is restoring his relationships with his children.



2017 REFLECTIONS

2017 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Launched new programs to address evolving community needs, such as a program focused on housing individuals released from the County jail and an alternative sentencing program for youth that is more flexible than the Juvenile Drug Court approach
- Hosted Data Convenings which brought together TST-funded programs to share data, ask questions, and discuss opportunities for improvement and collaboration
- Continued efforts to ensure alignment with national best practices, through participation in learning opportunities such as the National Association of Drug Court Professionals Annual Training Conference (NADCP)
- Examined gaps and opportunities in the local behavioral health system with the start of a TST Opportunity Analysis

GOALS FOR THE FUTURE

- Improve strategic alignment of Treatment Sales Tax with related Thurston County programs and initiatives
 - The transfer of TST administration to Thurston County Public Health and Social Services in 2018 is designed to facilitate improved coordination across related programs
- More effectively use and share data related to TST programs
- Continue program improvement efforts through alignment with national and state best practices
- Ensure TST-funded programs are targeted to serve individuals most in need of these interventions
