**Thurston County - Medic One
Proposition No. 1
Levy Lid Lift**

The Board of County Commissioners of Thurston County adopted Ordinance No. 16014 concerning property taxes for Medic One emergency medical care and services. This proposition would increase the 2022 regular property tax levy for emergency medical care and services to \$0.35/\$1,000 of assessed value (approximately \$0.06 increase); set the limit factor for calculating levy rates in each of the years 2023 through 2027 at 107%, or approximately \$0.03/\$1,000 per year; provide that the levy for 2027 would be used to compute limits on levies after 2027 under chapter 84.55 RCW; and exempt eligible seniors, veterans and disabled persons under RCW 84.36.381.

**Thurston County Fire Protection District 12
Proposition No. 1
Bonds to Construct New Fire Station**

The Board of Fire Commissioners of Thurston County Fire Protection District 12 (South Thurston Fire & EMS) adopted Resolution No. 2021-03, concerning bonds to finance a new fire station, vehicles and equipment. This proposition would authorize the District to: construct and equip a new 24-hour shift capable fire station to meet the South Thurston community's current and future emergency response needs; acquire a new fire engine, aid unit, pumper tender and land for the new station; issue no more than \$5,775,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 20 years; and levy annual excess property taxes to repay the bonds, all as provided in Resolution No. 2021-03.

**Thurston County Fire Protection District No. 13 (Griffin)
Proposition No. 1
Levy Lid Lift**

The Board of Commissioners of Thurston County Fire Protection District No. 13 adopted Resolution No. 21-003 concerning a proposition to restore the regular property tax levy. This levy, if approved, would maintain fire and emergency medical service levels including personnel, maintenance and replacement costs. This measure will restore the District's 2021 regular property tax levy to \$1.50 per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation for collection in 2022 and would authorize setting a 106% limit for each of the five succeeding years. The maximum allowable levy in 2027 shall be used to determine future increases as allowed by Chapter 84.55 RCW.

**SE Thurston Fire Authority
Proposition No. 1
Authorizing Restoration of Previous Property Tax Levy
Levy Lid Lift**

The Board of Fire Commissioners of S.E. Thurston Fire Authority adopted Resolution No. 2021-FA-02 concerning a proposition to restore the Fire Authority's regular property tax levy. This proposition restores the 2022 regular property tax levy to an amount not to exceed \$1.50 per \$1,000 assessed valuation and setting the limit factor for calculating the levy amounts for 2023 through 2027 at 106% (but not to exceed a rate of \$1.50).

Revenues would be used for fire protection, prevention, and emergency medical services, maintenance, operation and replacement costs. The maximum permitted levy amount for 2027 would become the base for computing future levy limits.
