Chair McPhee gave the floor to Chief Brooks (Lacey FD #3) to introduce their 12 newly hired firefighters which are funded by a Safer Grant they received. This funding allows Lacey FD #3 to reopen their Jubilee station which has been closed for nearly a year.

- I. CALL TO ORDER/ROLL CALL** – Chairman McPhee called the regular meeting of the Emergency Medical Services Council (EMSC) to order at 3:33 PM. Roll was recorded by staff.
- II. APPROVAL OF AGENDA –MSC** (Kirkbride/Ricks) move to approve the agenda correcting New Business Item C presenter to Wright.
- III. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION** – Chair McPhee introduced Tony Kuzma, temporary replacement representative for AMR (Greg Pulver). Romines introduced Chief Robin Duncan, FD#12 Tenino, Janet who recently passed away was Robin’s wife. Both Robin and Janet have served as EMS responders in the system for over 30 years. Janet was involved in the Operations Committee for 15 years, she was one of the first EMT’s trained to use manual defibs. Chair McPhee presented FD #12, Chief Robin Duncan a plaque honoring Janet Duncan, Assistant Fire Chief FD #12 who recently lost battle with cancer. Romines expanded on the tremendous amount of participation and dedication Janet gave to the Thurston County EMS system and Fire District #12.

- V. COMMITTEE REPORTS**
- A. OPERATIONS COMMITTEE – Wright reported policy review is underway and they will be brought to Council in small groups of like policies with the first group consisting of Ops approved rescinded policies that need EMS Council approval.
- B. WEST REGION EMS COUNCIL– The region is working on updating the regional plan and one component is the min/max verified trauma agency update. The conference is completed, it was successful, and now the region will examine feedback from the conference and look at the financial bottom line to see if they will hold a conference next year.
- C. STAFF REPORT– Romines highlighted on staff report included in the packet:
- Washington State EMS Rules and Responsibility Committee – Romines and Anne Benoist have been asked to participate as West Region representatives in a State-wide EMS advisory group.
 - Protocol update – We have signed a contract with an “App” vendor who will create our EMS protocols in both Iphone and Android format.
 - Paramedic exam May 14 & 15, 2013.
 - EMT course underway at District #9 with 28 enrolled.
 - Legislative report – per handout noting items that have changed including the EMS levy lift which did not make it through the committee and is currently dead.
 - Medic One received a certificate of appreciation from the Thurston County Fair for our participation.
 - Final 2012 Business Plan
 - Cardiac arrest survival rate dropped in 2012 to 45%, with one additional save. Romines continued that Medic One has adopted the AHA resuscitation procedure for cardiac arrest. Dr. Fontanilla expanded the primary

VI. OLD BUSINESS –

- A. Nominations Committee – McPhee reported both nominations committee members were absent. Chief Carpenter read nominations committee member Betsy Spaths' report to recommend Margaret McPhee and Tom Fell to run again, Chair McPhee requested any nominations from the floor, Romines added, nominations committee member Dave Ribacchi who could not attend due to an injury, McPhee again requested any nominations from the floor, **MSC** (Kirkbride/Parsons) move to close nominations and cast unanimous vote.
- B. TRPC Update – McPhee read Dave Ribacchi's report on the TRPC update summarized as follows: "TRPCs' Paul Brewster has brought the study to a point where the EMSC may begin to consider the subjects that have emerged as items of interest. As of now, TRPC has 5 or so subjects areas that the council may want to consider. Before bringing them to the council, Paul was scheduled to contact additional relevant resources to aid in forming these findings meeting the scope of this first phase. These additional contacts may take us to the end of the month. The council will then have the opportunity to refine the subjects, merge some or divide others and begin the process of prioritizing. Upon completion of ranking of subjects, I would expect the council to recommend to the County Commissioners next steps and alternatives, keeping in mind the value propositions and scope scaling we established as boundaries". Council discussion followed.
- C. 2012/2013 Budget/Program Review – Romines gave a presentation which highlighted the 2012 actual expenditures and the BOCC adopted 2013 budget and how each program falls within the budget. Romines handed out a spreadsheet showing a levy life projection which projects revenues against expenditures and when we will need to request a levy lid lift, he provided explanation of the spreadsheet.

VII. NEW BUSINESS –

- A. EMS Week May 19-25, 2013 – Romines reported the Thurston County 2013 EMS week is May 19-25 this year with a BOCC signed proclamation and letter that will be sent to all departments with a special event (more details to come).
- B. BLS Funding Allocation – Romines explained the BLS support funding allocation worksheet with council discussion following.
- C. Min/Max Verified Trauma Agency – Ops Chair Wright brought the Operations Committee recommendation which provide the flexibility for all agencies we currently have within the county and additional flexibility for some upcoming changes without putting us into a problem with the State. Council discussion followed. **MSC** (Kirkbride/Carpenter) move to approve Operations Committee recommendations, two members opposed (Ricks/Bostwick).

- I. **CALL TO ORDER/ROLL CALL** - Chairman Wright called the regular meeting of the Operations Committee to order at 2:04 PM. Roll was recorded by staff.
- II. **APPROVAL OF AGENDA – MSC** (Low/Quackenbush) to approve the agenda moving Old Business Item VI.C. Medic One Policies Review to the end of New Business.

- IV. **REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES**
 - A. OPERATIONS COMMITTEE – March 7, 2013 (April mtg. canceled) **MSC** (Quackenbush/Brooks) to approve.
 - B. EMS COUNCIL – March 20, 2013 (April mtg. canceled) – (Informational Only).
- V. **COMMITTEE REPORTS**
 - A. WEST REGION – No report.
 - B. SUBCOMMITTEES
 - A. Equipment Committee (EqC) – No meeting, no report.
 - B. Mass Casualty Incident (MCI) Committee – Suver reported MCI training in OTEP continues.
 - C. Training Advisory Committee (TAC) – Hambly highlighted on TAC minutes handed out:
 - Agencies with in-house instructor/evaluators are required to attend the update instructor/evaluator class, next class is in October.
 - Still working on increasing instructor/evaluator faculty. Still limited with teachers who teach County-wide.
 - Reviewed Ops direction as to where to go next to increase capacity for initial training.
 - Discussions of videotaping to enhance training.
 - DOH email regarding Washington State GAP Analysis – this new curriculum was introduced in the fall of 2011 to new students and rolled out in OTEP in 2012.
 - The June 19 TAC meeting canceled, July 10th to include June agenda items; and August 21st.
 - Continue to work to enhance training through technology and increase faculty capacity.
 - C. STAFF - Romines highlighted on Staff report handout:
 - EMS Week May 19 – 25, BOCC will do a proclamation May 7th. The EMS week flyer will go as an insert in the newspaper, a special event will take place at the BOCC meeting to kick-off EMS week and Hambly requested providers participate in uniform to both the BOCC meeting on May 7th and another event at the Capital Mall on May 18th at 1:00 PM.
 - Steve attended a cyber security summit put on by the State of Washington; the message from the seminar is to ensure you have ways to recover your systems in the event of a cyber attack.
 - Systems operational review – request from TRPC to provide BLS data that is age-specific for the past 5 years. Romines requested input from agencies to facilitate TRPC's request. Committee discussion followed with selected agencies to test-run reports to capture the data from the various data systems. TRPC to forward request to Lacey, Tumwater and Olympia.

- Washington State Roles and Responsibilities committee – next meeting scheduled for May 16th.
- Medic exam scheduled this month.
- Highlight on EMS related Legislative bills (update handed out)

VI. OLD BUSINESS

- A. EMS Council Action Report– Meeting canceled no update.
- B. Special Projects – SP subcommittee reported they reviewed the applications and collectively agreed they all met the requirements and the total requests came in below the budget threshold. Verified all SORT requests were funneled through District 9 as previously requested by the Ops committee. We recommend funding all requests as presented for a total of \$6,912 of non-SORT requests and \$5,000 for SORT requests for a total funding of \$11,912. **MSC** (Quackenbush/Fontanilla) motion to approve as presented. Committee discussion followed regarding SORT requesting consideration for 100% (\$5,000) SORT funding. A letter from the SORT representative agency will be provided to support their 100% request. Staff to update rating matrix to include: “agencies are providing \$6,000 for SORT support”.

- B. 2013 Business Plan – Romines – Q1 update was included in your packet, no report.
- C. Funding Spreadsheet – Romines reported the spreadsheet provided was an update to a previous version that had a formula error. Distributions will be sent this month. Committee discussion followed
- D. BLS Response Time Report (draft) – Romines handed out and explained the updated BLS response time report. Romines expanded on the report in detail with committee discussion following. Staff to modify report, include the disclaimer and bring back at next meeting.
- E. Communicable Disease Exposure Plan – Hambly reported on a recent exposure that occurred and a breakdown in communications and notifications that was discovered as a result. Hambly made contact with the hospitals, Health Department and agencies involved and is following up on updating the process for a significant exposure. Dr. Pellicier will provide Medic One with an updated exposure control plan to include meningitis etc. from the hospital; Medic One is working to provide the hospital with a single point of contact for notifying EMS providers on call. Committee discussion followed with Hambly to bring update back at next month's meetings.

Protocol app (iphone/android) contract signed, to start by June 1, 2013.

Medic One 2013 budget and business plan, draft to Committee, committee reported to July EMSC, status quo and enhanced (\$9k ALS Airway training, \$5k static station IP, \$10k MCI/field tx site, \$7.5k SWAT/MPD, \$15k BLS direct financial, \$15k BLS supplies/equipment). MPD contract change, EMS support of SWAT to BOCC, approved. EMS Council approves recommendation for 2013 Business Plan and Budget at enhanced level. Budget as recommended by the EMS Council presentation has been given to the BOCC, adopted as submitted December 7.

Medic hiring and oral exams took place in late October, with 1 addition to the hiring list. October 2012: 21 applicants (19 to written, 4 new candidates to oral), 8 passed written, 2 oral retakes, 7 to oral, 1 passed oral, 3 already on list= 4 total on current list. **Next exam May 14&15, 2013**, applications open 3/11, **closed with 44 new apps/5 retest oral.**

Important 2013 Session Cut-off Dates

- 1/14 First Day of Session.
 - 2/22 Last day to read in committee reports in house of origin, except House fiscal committees and Senate Ways & Means and Transportation committees.
 - 3/1 Last day to read in committee reports from House fiscal committees and Senate Ways & Means and Transportation committees in house of origin.
 - 3/13 Last day to consider bills in house of origin (5 p.m.).
 - 4/3 Last day to read in committee reports from opposite house, except House fiscal committees and Senate Ways & Means and Transportation committees.
 - 4/9 Last day to read in opposite house committee reports from House fiscal committee and Senate Ways & Means and Transportation committees.
 - 4/17 Last day to consider opposite house bills (5 p.m.) (except initiatives and alternatives to initiatives, matters necessary to implement budgets, amendments, differences, and business related to the interim or closing the session).
 - 4/28 Sine Die -- Last day allowed for regular session under state constitution.
- The Governor has five (5) days, excluding Sundays, to take action on any bill passed by the Legislature, provided adjournment does not occur within those five (5) days.

It requires operators suspected of boating under the influence to submit to a breathalyzer or blood test or be subject to a Class 1 civil infraction punishable by a \$500 fine. It also elevates the penalty for a BUI conviction to a gross misdemeanor, which is punishable by imprisonment up to 364 days, a fine of up to \$5,000, or both.</p> <p>It requires boat rental businesses to supply all of the necessary safety equipment, at no extra cost.</p> <p>It allows officers to cite or arrest a negligent boater when, through the course of an investigation, the officer determines the operator’s boating safety violation caused or contributed to the collision (eliminating the requirement for the officer to witness the collision).</p> <p>Substitute: The substitute changed language in two sections of RCW 10.31.100.
