### Minutes for December 10, 2013

### 1) 3:35 p.m. Call Board of Health Meeting to Order

In Attendance: Karen Valenzuela, Chair; Cathy Wolfe, Vice Chair; Cliff Moore, County Manager; Don Sloma, Public Health & Social Services Department Director; Art Starry, Environmental Health Division Director and Lydia Hodgkinson, Clerk of the Board of Health

Excused Absence: Sandra Romero, Commissioner

Chair Valenzuela called the Board of Health meeting to order.

- a) **Approval of the Board of Health Agenda:** Vice Chair Wolfe moved to approve the agenda for December 10, 2013. Chair Valenzuela seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- b) **Approval of Board of Health meeting minutes:** Vice Chair Wolfe moved to approve the Board of Health meeting minutes from November 12, 2013. Chair Valenzuela seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- c) Election of Board of Health Chair and Vice Chair for 2014:
  - Commissioner Valenzuela nominated and moved to appoint Commissioner Wolfe as 2014 Board of Health Chair. Commissioner Wolfe seconded the motion. Motion carried.
  - Commissioner Wolfe nominated and moved to appoint Commissioner Romero as 2014 Board of Health Vice Chair. Commissioner Valenzuela seconded the motion. Motion carried.

### 2) Thurston Thrives Advisory Council Meeting

a) Member Appreciation: Chair Valenzuela opened the Thurston Thrives Advisory Council meeting and expressed her appreciation to the Members of the Advisory Council for their participation and hard work. She then presented each of the Members in attendance with a Thurston Thrives lapel pin.

Michael Cade, Advisory Council Member, expressed his appreciation of the pin and the opportunity to participate in the Thurston Thrives Initiative.

In attendance for Public Health and Social Services Department (PHSS) staff: Don Sloma, Director; Mary Ann O'Garro, Epidemiologist and Chris Hawkins, Active Healthy Communities Coordinator.

### b) Introductions -

Chair Valenzuela, Housing Action Team Lead, stated the Housing Action Team is the fourth Thurston Thrives Action Team to present to the Advisory Council. The presentation will provide a summary of the work they have completed to date.

Chair Valenzuela, Housing Action Team Lead introduced Housing Action Team Members in attendance: Chris Van Daalen; Trudy Soucoup; Doug Deforest; Schelli Slaughter; Theresa Slusher; John Masterson; and Curt Andino.

### c) Topic Area Definition and Health Implications

Mary Ann O'Garro, Public Health and Social Services Department (PHSS) Epidemiologist, gave a presentation providing a summary of implications and community data; information on how housing is fundamental to health and well-being; and what we know locally based on the data collected within our community by the Thurston Thrives Housing Action Team. Ouestions and discussion followed.

### d) Community Data/Assessment and Risks

Ms. O'Garro provided a Data Snapshot Report of the most current local data that supports the work of the Thurston Thrives Housing Action Team examining the connections between housing and health. The report provided a current snapshot of community health issues associated with access and quality of housing.

e) Community Analysis of Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats (SWOT) Chair Valenzuela, Team Lead, explained the Team is a combination of service providers, developers, realtors and government employees. The Team believes increase of housing security for County residents will depend upon the collective efforts of three sectors: the private sector, public sector (government) and non-profits sector. She explained instead of using the SWOT format the Team used the "Ice Berg Model" focusing on the 15% of Thurston County residents who are severely housing cost burdened and homeless. Faith Trimble gave a brief description of the "Ice Berg Model" and why the Team chose this format. Chair Valenzuela described the Team's vision and goals. Comments, questions and discussion followed.

### f) Recommended Strategic Map and Plan

Chair Valenzuela gave a brief overview of the Strategy Map and Logic Model which included Activities, Objectives, Goals and the Housing Team Vision. The Activities are best practices followed in each of the action areas. The following Action Team Members described and explained the Logic Model Activities action areas and the Objectives:

- Curt Andino Financing Services
- Chris Van Daalen Construction, Standards, Infrastructure and Safety
- Theresa Slusher Homeless Prevention and Supportive Services Activity
- Trudy Soucoup Revitalization, Rehab and Maintenance Activity, also provided information about "Homes First!"
- John Masterson also spoke in regards to Homeless Prevention and Supportive Services
- Lisa Smith (Advisory Council Member) Education and Outreach; also provided information about "Enterprise for Equity"

Chair Valenzuela described the Logic Model Goals: increase available housing choices for all, especially low-income; increase self-sufficiency for homeowners and renters; so that housing supports neighborhood stability and people's health and well- being. Chair Valenzuela discussed the "Key Measure: 15% of low-income residents who are spending more than 50% of income on housing" and "Target: reduce by half". She then described the "next steps" for the Housing Action Team: refine map, fine tune measures and set targets, inventory "who is doing what", identify gaps and actions to close them, identify needs profile and match with current housing stock, connect with Economy and Community Design Action Teams and identify leads to champion action.

- Lisa Smith described Individual Developmental Accounts (IDA) program

Chair Valenzuela thanked the Advisory Board Members for their comments and hard work.

- Vice Chair Wolfe recommended the Housing Action Team put some thought and discussion into the benefits of shared housing.

Chair Valenzuela thanked the Housing Action Team Members for their comments and hard work.

### 4) <u>Approval of Resolution H-3-2013 Appointing Alternate 2014 Thurston County</u> Local Health Officers

Don Sloma, PHSS Director, stated each year the Board of Health formally appoints alternate Health Officers to serve should emergency situations arise when the primary Health Officer appointed by the Board of Health for Thurston County, is not available due to illness, vacation, etc. Resolution No. H-3-2013 retains Alan Melnick, MD, MPH, James Edstam, MD, MPH, John Bausher, MD, and Steve Standaert, MD, MPH and adds Scott Lindquist, MD, MPH as alternate Health Officers for 2014. The appointment of an alternate local Health Officer shall be activated when contacted to act in the capacity of the Thurston County local Health Officer by the following individuals: the primary local Health Officer for Thurston County, the Director of Thurston County Public Health and Social Services, or the Chair of the Thurston County Board of Health. The Board shall be immediately notified in the event an Alternate Health Officer is appointed.

Vice Chair Wolfe moved to approve Resolution H-3-2013 appointing Alan Melnick, MD, MPH, James Edstam, MD, MPH, John Bausher, MD, Steve Standaert, MD, MPH and Scott Lindquist, MD, MPH as alternate Health Officers for 2014. Chair Valenzuela seconded the motion. Motion carried.

### 5) Approval of Lewis County Contract for Health Officer Services

Don Sloma described the contract between Thurston County and Lewis County which provides Health Officer Services to Lewis County for the time period of December 3, 2013 through December 31, 2014 for a maximum compensation of \$46,738. The Contract requires 8 hours per week of Thurston County's Health Officer Dr. Rachel Wood's time. Each year these services and hours are evaluated before considering continuation of the contract.

Vice Chair Wolfe moved to approve the Lewis County Contract for Health Officer Services for the time period of December 3, 2013 through December 31, 2014 for a maximum compensation of \$46,738. Chair Valenzuela seconded the motion. Motion carried.

### 7) <u>Director's Report</u> - Don Sloma reported on:

- ♦ Homeless Connect Event held on Saturday, December 7, 2013 PHSS partnered with the Olympia Free Clinic, Olympia Union Gospel Mission and Sea Mar to provide health and medical services to the homeless:
  - o 44 received medical services 29 received vaccinations
  - o 55 total vaccination dispensed
  - o 15 completed/started applications for health insurance
  - o 5 referrals for same day medical care

- o 31 volunteers participated in the Health and Medical station
- o 200+ hours of volunteer service time

### ♦ Tobacco-Free Campus

- o Notices about Thurston County's Tobacco Free Campus policy have been posted.
- A new webpage provides details on the policy, resources for quitting tobacco and information about the effects of secondhand smoke exposure.

### ♦ Quixote Village

- Framing, insulation, exterior painting, HVAC, electrical and plumbing systems and roofing have been completed for the Community Center and cottages. Remaining work includes installing interior sheet rock, finishes and final site work.
- The project is scheduled for completion by late December or early January 2014.

### ◆ Thurston Mason Regional Support Network (RSN)

O Discussions between the State of Washington Department of Social & Health Services (DSHS) and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) regarding the procurement process for RSNs are ongoing. A response from the state is due to CMS by December 5, 2013.

### ♦ Urban Septic System Assessment

- Key elements of the project include: inventorying septic systems in urban areas; identifying areas where septic systems pose a risk to water resources; identifying priority areas for conversion; and developing a collaborative, regional approach to convert priority areas. The project will conclude by September 2014.
- The consultant team will help explore financial and legal mechanisms governing conversion of communities to sewer and develop options for a collaborative, regional approach to sewer conversion.

### ♦ Chemical Dependency Program

- Staff worked with North Thurston School District to prepare educational materials, *Marijuana, What Parent's Should Know*, that were available for parents at North Thurston and River Ridge High Schools during parent teacher conferences.
- The program sponsored training on Motivational Interviewing to increase understanding and use of this effective, evidenced-based, recovery practice; over 70 people from Thurston County's Drug Court, Family Recovery Court, the Thurston CASA program, and local treatment agencies attended.

### ♦ Toxics Reduction Education

- Land care professionals from several public agencies received Organic Land Care
   Accreditation through Oregon Tilth's nationally recognized program. Environmental
   Health provided the training in partnership with Oregon Tilth.
- o Adults and teens learned to recognize and avoid hazardous substances and chemicals of concern in personal care products at a recent workshop.

### <u>Health Officer's Report</u> – Dr. Rachel Wood reported on:

### ♦ Infectious Disease Control & Prevention

- O Gonorrhea, a sexually transmitted infection that can be serious if not treated, is on the rise in Thurston County and throughout Washington State. Health care providers have been asked to increase surveillance, report cases, and treat patients and their partners to interrupt transmission of the disease.
- o Measles/Rubella two cases reported; exposure on airplanes



### Minutes of December 10, 2013

Public Hearing to receive testimony on proposed amendments to Article I; Article I, Appendix A (the Environmental Health Fee Schedule) and Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Thurston County Board of Health.

### **CALL PUBLIC HEARING TO ORDER**

**Attendance:** Karen Valenzuela, Chair; Cathy Wolfe, Vice Chair; Cliff Moore, County Manager; Don Sloma, Public Health & Social Services Department Director; Art Starry, Environmental Health Division Director and Lydia Hodgkinson, Clerk of the Board of Health

Chair Valenzuela called the public hearing to order at 5:35 P.M. at the Thurston County Courthouse.

Art Starry, Environmental Health Division Director of the Public Health & Social Services Department, provided a summary of the request to adopt an Ordinance amending the Sanitary Code for Thurston County Article I, sections 12.3, 12.4, 18.2, 19.1, and 19.5, Article I, Appendix A, and Article III.

The recently amended Chapter 246-291WAC - Group B water systems goes into effect January 1, 2014. Group B public systems serve small subdivisions (2-14 homes), home-based businesses, campgrounds, community facilities or churches. Thurston County has a Group B public water system program. With the assistance of stakeholders, Environmental Health Division staff drafted amendments to the County water supply regulations, Article III, that are consistent with the new state law and maintain the annual permit and monitoring program for Group B water systems.

The proposed rules are as follows:

- Adopt Chapters 246-290 and 246-291 WAC by reference, which will substantially reduce the length of Article III, eliminate redundancy, and help assure consistency with state law
- Amend the process for obtaining approval for a new source in an area where water service is already available to require approval from the jurisdictional hearing officer
- Exempt two party residential wells from design and annual permit requirements of the code while preserving basic water quality and source protection requirements (as needed to comply with the certificate of water availability process)
- Require all water system designs for new or expanding public water systems to comply with state law and be prepared by a professional engineer
- Establish a provisionally adequate category for water systems in existence before May 1, 1994 providing they meet water quality and basic sanitation requirements

- Retain the water quality monitoring and annual permit requirements that are currently required in Thurston County
- Eliminate bonding of water supplies in lieu of completion for water supplies involved in land use projects
- Amend enforcement provisions to allow for the use of civil infractions and civil penalties

Proposed amendments to Article I and Appendix A (Environmental Health fee schedule) will fully implement Article III. These changes are as follows:

- Recognize and authorize the civil infraction and civil penalty provisions in Article III
- Delete fees for activities and services that will be eliminated with the amendments to Article III
- Change the Consumer Price Index date used to establish fee adjustments from June to April to be consistent with other county processes and mesh better with the county budget process

Mr. Starry noted the proposed ordinance and draft rules have been posted on-line and have been available at the Permit Assistance Center since November 15, 2013. Hearing notices were published in the *Daily Olympian* on November 17, 2013 and December 1, 2013, in the *Nisqually Valley News* on November 22, 2013 and December 6, 2013, and in the *Tenino Independent* on November 20, 2013. The proposed rule changes were the topic of a community meeting held on September 19, 2013. To date, all stakeholders and meeting participants have supported the proposed amendments.

Chair Valenzuela thanked all staff, and acknowledged Sara Brallier and Erik Iverson, for their hard work.

No testimony was received. The Public Hearing was closed.

Vice-Chair Wolfe moved to adopt the Ordinance amending the Sanitary Code for Thurston County Article I, sections 12.3, 12.4, 18.2, 19.1, and 19.5, Article I, Appendix A, and Article III. Chair Valenzuela seconded the motion. Motion carried.


### ISSUE STATEMENT


Education beyond high school is increasingly important in obtaining living wage employment, thereby reducing unemployment-related social costs and taxpayer burdens...

... yet nearly half of the youth who were part of the class of 2012 (9th graders in 2008) have not yet enrolled in a post-secondary institution, ...

...so, enrollment in post-secondary education, in addition to high school completion, must be elevated as a policy issue in Thurston County.
