





Enrollments by type of household











Chronically Homeless at Project Entry



Data Narrative

- We are seeing a small but notable increase of individuals and families entering projects in Q2.
- As a community within HMIS our data quality is increasing, as we get better about the timeliness in which entry occurs, and the completeness of what is entered. This increases the reliability of what we are seeing within these reports.
- Those that report a disability and/or chronic homeless status continues to increase, up from 31% in 2019 and 33% in 2020.

The data included below represents only the projects from each of these agencies that enter data into HMIS. It does not represent the sum of their program activities during this time period.
