





### Enrollments by type of project






All demographic information is a year-to-date percentage of distinct individuals who have enrolled in a housing project in 2022, as reported in HMIS.

### Chronically Homeless at Project Entry




The Federal definition of “chronic homelessness” is someone who has experienced homelessness for at least a year – either 12 months or more in a row, or several shorter experiences of homelessness that add up to a year – while struggling with a disabling condition such as a serious mental illness, substance use disorder, or physical disability.

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## Data Narrative

- We saw large fluctuations in the data regarding Coordinated Entry, as the community switched providers and Single Adult CE was put on hold for a time.
- The eco-system of the Homeless Crisis Response system has remained relatively stable since the COVID-19 pandemic began in Quarter 2 of 2020, with sustained impacts across all housing types and sub-populations.

The data included below represents only the projects from each of these agencies that enter data into HMIS. It does not represent the sum of their program activities during this time period. 2022 (October-December) totals below.
