#1 - Walk-in Passport Services Now Available at the Auditor's Office



Passport Services are now offered without an appointment during regular business hours at the Thurston County Auditor's Office. While walk-in service is available, it's still highly encouraged you make an appointment to ensure prompt service instead of a potentially long wait time.

The Auditor's Office is the only provider of passport services in Thurston County during regular business hours, 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. The Auditor's passport facility is located at 3000 Pacific Ave SE, Olympia, WA 98501.

The Auditor's Office offers the following advice to facilitate the walk-in process:

- Walk-in hours for passports are from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.
- Walk-ins should check-in at the lobby kiosk to receive their number.
- Arrive early in the day when business is lighter. This typically results in faster service.
- Due to lunch breaks, staffing levels are limited between noon and 2:00 p.m.
- Complete all paperwork before arriving.
- If you plan to have your picture taken wear dark clothes, they produce a better photo. Please do not wear white or cream clothing.
- Your patience is appreciated.
- The U.S. Department of State portion of the fees must be paid by check or money order.

#2 - Bronka Sundstrom: A Legacy of Resilience and

Tenacity Honored at the Chehalis Western Trail



A tribute to Bronka Sundstrom, a Holocaust survivor who embodies resilience and tenacity, was recently unveiled at Chambers Lake Overlook on the Chehalis Western Trail (CWT) in Thurston County. Sundstrom, who emigrated from Poland after surviving Auschwitz and Bergen-Belsen, left a lasting mark on the Pacific Northwest with her love for the outdoors and her record-setting achievement of scaling Mount Rainier at age 77. The dedicated bench along the trail captures her enduring spirit, serving as both a physical rest spot for travelers and a symbol of her passion for the natural world.

This monument provides an opportunity for visitors to reflect on Sundstrom's life, her triumphs over adversity, and her zest for life, embodying her mantra of "Never give up, always go forward." The bench exemplifies Thurston County's commitment to preserving and celebrating the region's natural beauty.
