## **Keep it loose** Do not bag recyclables or compost

In Thurston County, we do our part to recycle, but certain actions actually hurt more than they help. If you put recyclables in plastic bags and then toss them in the curbside bin, your items won't get recycled. If they do end up at the recycling facility, plastic bags clog up the machines and bring the whole process to a grinding halt.

Even paper bags and boxes should be emptied before going in your bin. So don't bag or box your recyclables – just toss them loose into the bin.

#### Kitchen food scraps should be loose too!

That's right; there are no bags of any kind accepted in the curbside food and yard waste program. All materials must be completely loose inside your curbside food and yard waste bin. This is tricky because some bags are labeled as compostable, but none are compatible with our local commercial composting facility.

#### What can we do with plastic bags and wrap?

Something to keep in mind...and out of your recycling bin: loose plastic bags and plastic film are also a big no-go for the recycling stream.

*Empty all contents before placing in the cart. Do not put recyclables inside anything, including paper bags and boxes.* 

Anything that's thin, stretchy, and plastic – like the wrapping on paper towel rolls – causes major problems with recycling equipment and should not be placed in your curbside bin.

Instead, you can reuse plastic bags or bundle them with your film and take it all back to participating retailers for specialized recycling. So to wrap it all up: simply keep plastic bags and film out of your recycling bin.

# Where Do I Take My...? Search hundreds of materials online


