<b>Discussion Points:</b>	This briefing covered the SSWAB's work over the past year, outcomes of their
	retreat, and their future plans. Mr. Wager expressed appreciation for
	Commissioner Mejia's remarks made at the retreat as well as staff support.
	Mr. Hartley reviewed highlights of the past year and explained how the SSWAB
	fulfills its responsibilities. Efforts included acquiring knowledge in preparation for
	generating recommendations in the upcoming year. The SSWAB tracks a series
	of metrics they established for the stormwater program. Mr. Hartley raised the
	subject of how the SSWAB's composition will look with transition to five
	commissioner districts considering the difficulty in filling vacant positions.
	Mr. Means cherred the subscripts from the $COMAD's$ lung $O^{th}$ retract. The
	Mr. Wager shared the outcomes from the SSWAB's June 9 <sup>th</sup> retreat. The SSWAB desires to improve new member onboarding and advocate for
	developing a program to evaluate the efficacy of surface and stormwater capital
	improvement projects (CIP). In addition, the SSWAB would like to see more
	effort in soliciting early input on CIPs and provide information to those
	immediately impacted by those projects. The SSWAB aims to advise on the
	adequacy of funding for projects and programs. Performance metrics remain a
	high interest of the SSWAB. SSWAB members desire engagement in the
	County's Comprehensive Planning process and the Storm and Surface Water
	Comprehensive Study. Another desire involves SSWAB outreach to other jurisdictions and partners on a peer-to-peer level.

	Commissioner Edwards brought up issues involving tire deterioration's impact
	on salmon and wondered if street sweeping could help. The various factors
	involved were discussed, including pollutant removal methods and the cost-
	benefit considerations of street sweeping. Commissioner Edwards expressed
	his desire for the County to continue seeking grants to augment funds we
	collect. Larry Schaffer noted that the County has secured grants for capital improvement projects and plans to continue in those pursuits.
	Commissioner Mejia commended the SSWAB on tying the Comprehensive Plan
	into their efforts and expressed appreciation for the SSWAB's work.
