

### System Inflow & Outflow





### Enrollments by type of household









The PIT takes place each January, and is an attempt to count all people across the community experiencing homelessness.


All demographic information is a year-to-date CLIENT DEMOGRAPHICS percentage of distinct individuals who have enrolled in a housing project in 2023, as reported in HMIS.



The Federal definition of "chronic homelessness" is someone who has experienced homelessness for at least a year either 12 months or more in a row, or several shorter experiences of homelessness that add up to a year - while experiencing a disabling condition such as a serious mental illness, substance use disorder, or physical disability.




How long have you lived in Thurston?

## **Data Highlights**

- In the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter we see a slight change in demographics of those entering the system. More individuals are new to the system not chronically homeless. There is a relatively even split of ages entering the system, with 20% over 55. The population has tended to skew younger previously.
- Almost half of all households report some form of income, and over 30% report earned income through work.

The data included below represents only the projects from each of these agencies that enter data into HMIS. It does not represent the sum of their program activities during this time period.
