Dear Thurston County Superintendents and Heads of Schools,

On October 14, 2020, in response to increased transmission rates in Thurston County, I recommended a 14-day pause for additional in-person learning while determining the trajectory in COVID-19 transmission within our county. Thurston County crossed the high transmission threshold (>75 cases/100K over 14 days) using the Washington State Risk Assessment Dashboard on Friday, October 23, 2020. I will continue to monitor transmission rates in our county for a full incubation period. I am currently recommending extending the pause through November 6, 2020. If transmission rates remain above 75 cases/100,000 population over 14 days for a majority of those days, I will recommend a return to distance learning for all students with the exception of cohort groups of five students with the highest need.

This is a dynamic situation with inherent uncertainties going into winter where we traditionally see an increase in viral respiratory illnesses of all types. I will continue to look at rates and patterns of transmission within our community and provide guidance based on the best available data. I commend all of you for your efforts to keep those who work and learn in our schools safe in a rapidly changing and unprecedented circumstances.
