What is a Shoreline Master Program?

What are Shorelines?

Shorelines are protected by the Shoreline Management Act and generally include:

- Marine waters, lakes larger than 20 acres, streams with a flow of more than 20 cubic feet per second (cfs), and the shorelands associated with these waterbodies.

Who is Required to Update their SMP?

- All 260 local governments in Washington State are required to regularly review and make updates (as needed) to the policies and protections in their Shoreline Management Program (SMP).

What are the Primary Goals of an SMP?

Ensuring Washington State shorelines remain safe and unpolluted, are developed and managed fairly, and remain available for use by our children and future generations.

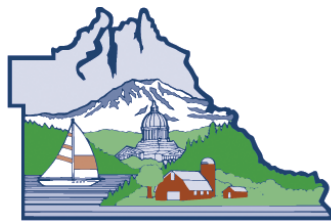
- The 3 main policy goals of the SMA: shoreline use, environmental protection, and public access.

What Activities Does the SMP Protect (regulate)?

- New development and industrial use along shorelines.
- Expansion and repair of existing structures along shorelines.
- New and replacement bulkheads and docks.
- Aquaculture operations.
- State mandated *no net loss* of shoreline ecological functions.
- Public access requirements.

What Process Informed These Updates?

- In 2003, the WA State Dept. of Ecology (Ecology) revised its legally-binding guidelines that outline the required elements of a local shoreline master program: For more information on this, visit: www.ecy.wa.gov/programs/sea/SMA/guidelines/index.html.
- Each program must be reviewed every seven years to ensure compliance.
- When Ecology approves a local shoreline master program, it becomes part of the overall statewide shoreline master program.
- Thurston County has held an open house and other public meetings for the SMP update. The Planning Commission is currently reviewing the draft SMP.
- For these types of updates, the Planning Commission holds a public hearing and makes a recommendation to the Board of County Commissioners (Board). The Board will hold its own hearing before adopting the SMP. The updated SMP must be approved by Ecology before it becomes final and takes effect.

What are the Benefits of an SMP?

Shoreline Master Programs contribute to local and statewide economic vitality by:

- Protecting lives and property by keeping development out of unstable or unsafe areas.
- Helping communities fulfill their vision for future waterfront development and shoreline uses.
- Providing more certainty to the development community through more consistent shoreline building ordinances and permitting requirements.
- Providing for public access and recreational opportunities in shoreline areas.
- Giving preference to water-dependent uses that rely on shorelines for economic viability.

Master programs also contribute to local and statewide environmental vitality by:

- Helping protect our marine waters, lakes, and stream systems from pollution.
- Protecting the overall health and function of shorelines and public waters for both public and private use.
- Protecting critical fish and wildlife habitat.
- Restoring unhealthy shorelines and increasing the health of public waters.

State & Local Roles in the Update Process:

Local Governments:

- Provide shoreline planning leadership within their jurisdictions and ensure all interests are brought to the table.
- Prepare, adopt, oversee and enforce their locally-crafted shoreline master programs.
- Send minor and comprehensive shoreline master program updates to Ecology for approval.
- Keep shoreline master programs current with periodic reviews.

The WA State Department of Ecology (Ecology):

- Provides state guidelines outlining the essential elements that local shoreline master programs must address.
- Provides grants and technical assistance to local governments.
- Reviews and approves local shoreline master programs to confirm consistency with state law.
- Once approved, individual local shoreline master programs become part of the overall state shoreline master program.

What an SMP DOES NOT do:

- Take away constitutional protections for private property rights.
- Require existing shoreline homes to be relocated.
- Try to return our shorelines to pre-settlement conditions.
